

Our Lady of Lourdes

February 11

Our Lady of Lourdes is a title of the Blessed Virgin Mary in honor of the Marian Apparition that took place in Lourdes, France, to a fourteen-year-old peasant girl, St. Bernadette Soubirous. There were a total of seventeen apparitions over the year 1858. Our Lady told St. Bernadette that we were to pray for the Conversion of Sinners, and she stated, "I am the Immaculate Conception". St. Bernadette was asked to dig in the ground and a "spring" would erupt. She did as she was told, and to this day the water runs. Nearly 6 million faithful make the pilgrimage annually, and hundreds of miracles have been reported through these visits.

St. Blaise February 3

According to tradition, Blaise had been a doctor before he was ordained a priest. He became the bishop of Sebaste (now in central Turkey). During a period of persecution, he fled to a cave where he lived as a hermit. It is said that he cured and tamed the wild animals there. One day hunters discovered him and took him to the governor, who sentenced him to be tortured and killed.


Legend says that while Blaise was in prison, a mother brought him her small boy, who was choking on a fishbone stuck in his throat. Blaise prayed over the child, and he was healed.

Every year on St. Blaise's feast, two candles tied with ribbon in the shape of an X are used to bless throats. In the prayer the Church prays that those blessed may be delivered from diseases of the throat and from every other illness. Candles are used because of another story: It is said that while Blaise was kept in a dark prison, a woman secretly brought him some candles and food. (Loyola Press)

Confirmation Service Project

The Corporal Works of Mercy are found in Jesus' teachings and give us a model on how we treat others:

"For I was hungry and you gave me food....Amen, I say to you, whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine, you did for me."

The Corporal Works of Mercy are a way in which we live out the Gospel in our daily lives. Our Confirmation students are learning the importance of the Corporal Works of Mercy with the various service projects we have scheduled for them during their faith journey this year.

The Confirmation class will be feeding the homeless at Poindexter Park near Iron Horse Grill in Jackson. We are working with Why Not Now Ministries who organizes these events. Local churches help this group prepare a meal to bring to the park for the homeless. St. Richard, St. Francis Madison, and St. Jude are a few of our sister churches who also participate in this ministry. We will cook spaghetti for about 100 people. On Sunday, February 12, we will divide the food into togo containers. We will start 9:00 Sunday morning before Mass to prepare the to-go containers.


We will leave immediately after Mass. Parents are needed to help transport food.

Adult Lenten Study Group

Fr. Lincoln will lead our adult Lenten faith group in the parish hall on Thursday's during Lent starting February 23 at 6:00 pm. We will be discussing the book Becoming Eucharistic People: The Hope and Promise of Parish Life, written by one of Father Lincoln's professors at the University of Notre Dame, Dr Timothy O'Malley. These sessions will last about an hour. Books will be available at Mass.



Ash Wednesday

February 22

Lent begins with Ash Wednesday on February 22. Lent is a 40 day season of prayer, fasting, and almsgiving that begins on Ash Wednesday and ends at sundown on Holy Thursday. It's a period of preparation to celebrate the Lord's Resurrection at Easter.

During Lent, we seek the Lord in prayer by reading Sacred Scripture; we serve by giving alms; and we practice selfcontrol through fasting. We are called not only to abstain from luxuries during Lent, but to a true inner conversion of heart as we seek to follow Christ's will more faithfully.

Catholics must fast and abstain from meat on Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, ages 18-59. Additionally, we must abstain from meat on all Fridays of Lent, ages 14 and up. (USCCB)

Adoration every Friday during Lent (except Good Friday) Noon - 5:00. Sign up beginning this weekend.

Stations of the Cross at 5:30 with Mass immediately after.

Friday meals after Mass in McGing Hall. Fried catfish alternates every other Friday with other meatless meals.





The Stations of the Cross are a way to pray and meditate on Christ's sacrifice for us. It is divided into fourteen stations from the time He was condemned to his burial until he was buried in the tomb. This devotion has been long encouraged by the church, and is especially useful during Lent and Good Friday.
